the job. Here are a few essential ones:

Enough sleep. A good night's sleep is essential to your children's health and success in school. Children

between the ages of seven and 12 need 10 to 11 hours of sleep per day.

A healthy breakfast. Cars can't run without fuel, and kids' brains are no differ-

ent. Many studies show that children who eat breakfast do better in class, earning higher grades and test scores. They are better able to focus and have fewer behaviour problems.
